
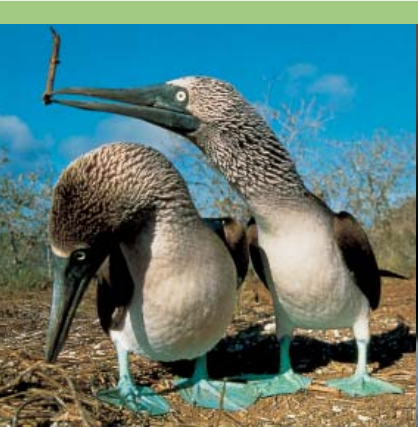




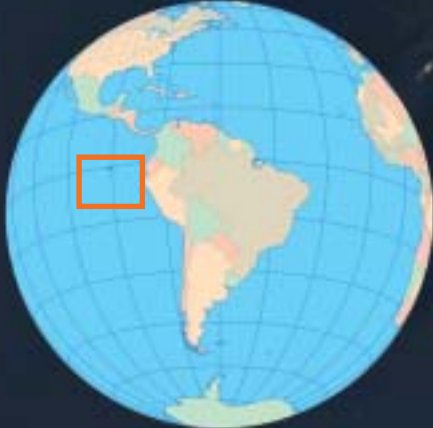

Terry's research interests focus on understanding earthquakes. He has traveled widely and is delighted that Brown has organized another trip to the Galápagos. It is probably his favorite destination of all his previous Brown trips, because it is such a wonderful natural laboratory for studying many aspects of natural history, a place where both the animals and the "hotspot" volcanoes are superstars.

A seafaring bishop named Tomas de Berlanga is credited with their discovery: stumbling upon Galápagos in 1535 en route from Panama to Peru. Herman Melville, struck by what he saw as their spectral desolation, made their name famous: *Las Encantadas*. But it was Charles Darwin who put Galápagos on the map. The five weeks he spent here

during the course of a five-year worldwide journey changed the course of human thought and history. We'll spend a week here, exploring the archipelago, much as he did: Leaving our floating base camp daily to explore different islands and (even Darwin couldn't do this) the undersea. We'll travel with a team of expert naturalists — observing & learning.

VOYAGING UNDER THE SOUTHERN CROSS

While our exact routing in Galápagos depends on the National Park Service, count on crisscrossing the equator as we navigate to each of these uniquely different islands. Here are a few of the high points ahead:



ESPAÑOLA: Home to the waved albatross and Hood mockingbird. A shoreline teeming with sea lions, marine iguanas and Nazca and blue-footed boobies.



FLOREANA: Colonies of sea lions. A mirror-still lagoon where pink flamingos often feed. A trail through a wild botanical garden. And an undersea world, too.

BARTOLOME: A tiny beauty with mangrove-fringed beaches. A summit view of spatter cones. And a small colony of Galápagos penguins at Pinnacle Rock.

ISABELA: Largest of the island group. Home to the Galápagos penguin — northern-most penguin in the world.

FERNANDINA: Dramatic lava patterns. Flightless cormorants. Sea lions basking. Mounds of lazy iguanas.

JAMES: Deep, wave-cut grottos. Fire-red Sally Lightfoot crabs. Shy, lovable fur seal pups peering from their rocks.

SANTA CRUZ: Headquarters of the National Park and Charles Darwin Research Station, where endangered giant tortoises are bred in captivity. Home to Lonesome George.

biological diversity

The sheer amount of wildlife here is amazing. Tortoises — including the legendary Lonesome George, the last of his species on earth. Blue-footed boobies. The famous finches. Beachmasters, harems and doe-eyed sea lion pups that swim with you. Skies filled with wheeling, courting, red-throated frigate birds. Lava rocks piled high with motionless marine iguanas. A mind-boggling plethora of creatures, untainted by fear, living in a paradise of azure waters,

white beaches and cool mangrove stands. Animal life varies from island to island, and with an experienced staff of naturalists, you encounter wildlife that is so plentiful you may have to watch your footing to avoid disturbing the nap of a resting sea lion or a passing iguana. It is simply a privilege to see these creatures in this place, manifesting these precise behaviors. This natural abundance makes the Galápagos one of the most impressive places on earth.



It's not only the biological diversity that will astound you, it's the sheer number of animals. So many creatures & so much fascinating behavior! Unique species arrayed before you. And you can walk freely among them – there's no fear at all.



As we voyage from island to island in the archipelago, we'll spend time in the richest wildlife locations in Galápagos. Depending on the season and the island we visit, we may see a giant tortoise, sunbathing iguana, Nazca boobies intimately conversing, swimming turtle, inquisitive sea lion, animated blue-footed boobies, a stately flamingo and (top) a frigate bird in full display (from January-June).

While the shadow of Darwin obviously lies over our Galápagos expeditions, our company pays daily homage to one of our heroes: the extraordinary Jacques Cousteau. Thanks to his example, we use nimble Zodiacs to make landfalls in the world's most adventurous locations — and offer an undersea program that keeps the element of “discovery” alive no matter how “mapped” the world of today is. And in Galápagos, seeing the undersea is so gratifying that we send our diver-naturalists down with a video camera to make sure those disinclined to “plunge” can still see the world below our ship. For those who snorkel, Galápagos offers pure magic. And we make it easy for virtually everyone to experience snorkel-

ing. A recent guest confided why he hadn't been snorkeling in over ten years: On a vacation in Fiji, a young guide took a group of snorkelers out, left them in 40-foot waters and said, “I'll be back in half an hour.” Our guest explained he felt anxious, and was unable to relax and enjoy. He was reluctant to even consider snorkeling again — until he was in Galápagos with us, and saw the quality of our logistics and care. He knew that if he felt at all uncomfortable, a waiting Zodiac would enable him to come out, rest, and go back into the water when he felt like it. No fear. No pressure. Just the pure unmitigated pleasure of being there — snorkeling amid the shimmering fish, the sea turtles and those “gymnasts,” the playful sea lions.



The waters of Galápagos are as rich with diversity as the land. Swim among sea lions and tempt a penguin to come close. Snorkel or ride in a glass bottom boat (on *Polaris*) discovering a lively undersea world.

ITINERARY | GALAPAGOS

10 DAYS/9 NIGHTS

Friday, Day 1 – U.S./Guayaquil, Ecuador

Depart U.S. and arrive Guayaquil by late evening. We've found that Miami is a convenient gateway for most, but other air alternatives are available. Our air coordinators can help determine which airline and flights are best for you.

If you choose to take the non-stop American Airlines group flight from Miami, we depart in the early evening, with a flying time of approximately 4 hours. Upon arrival in Guayaquil, it's a short drive to the Hotel Hilton Colón.

Saturday, Day 2 – Guayaquil/Galápagos/Embark *Polaris*

This morning fly to the Galápagos. Flying time is approximately 1½ hours; upon arrival immediately board the *Polaris*. During lunch we'll sail to Santa Cruz Island for a magnificent introduction to the wildlife of Galápagos. Spend the afternoon exploring mangrove-flanked channels and the shoreline of Cerro Dragon, looking for land iguanas, sea lions, a variety of birds and schools of golden rays.

Sunday, Day 3 – Española

Today visit two distinctly different parts of the same island. See blue-footed boobies, sea lions galore, Española marine iguanas which develop particularly vivid coloration, and waved albatross (mid-April through mid-December) exclusive to this island. You'll also get your first chance to snorkel and stroll one of Galápagos' best beaches.

Monday, Day 4 – Floreana/Isabela

For early risers, a Zodiac ride to Post Office Bay,

the "endemic" and historic Galápagos system for distributing mail via — you! Then more snorkeling or glass-bottom boating with sea lions. Later sail for Isabela, searching for dolphins, whales and other marine life along the way. In the afternoon, walk the streets of the small town of Puerto Villamil, visit the nearby saltwater lagoons, home to flamingos and many shore birds, or simply stroll along a beautiful beach.

Tuesday, Day 5 – Fernandina/Isabela

This morning explore Punta Espinoza on Fernandina Island — the most pristine and youngest island in Galápagos. It's marine iguana heaven, with Isabela's volcanoes as a dramatic backdrop. In the afternoon explore Isabela's caves and shoreline and search the waters for dolphins, whales, sea turtles and the astonishing and elusive ocean sunfish — the mola-mola.

Wednesday, Day 6 – Santa Cruz

The epicenter of Galápagos administration. The National Park headquarters is here, as well as the Charles Darwin Research Station where we'll learn about their vital preservation work. We'll head up into the highlands for lunch and roam the moss-draped lush landscape where wild tortoises often forage. In the evening, we'll invite guests from the Station and/or Park aboard to talk with us, and enjoy lively local music.

Thursday, Day 7 – Genovesa

One of the most isolated islands, Genovesa is a collapsed caldera allowing for a picture-perfect



anchorage. Home to the red-footed and Nazca booby, as well as a significant population of frigate birds, it's a great place to snorkel.

Friday, Day 8 – Bartolome/Santiago

Bartolome is an enchanting landscape where lava, mangroves and beautiful golden sand converge. Great walks, views and a good chance to snorkel with penguins — a tropical oxymoron. In the afternoon, Santiago provides us a chance to see the Galápagos fur seal, along with the opportunity to enjoy the best "tide pooling."

Saturday, Day 9 – Galápagos/Disembark/Quito

This morning disembark *Polaris* and fly to Quito. The afternoon and evening are free to explore this colonial city and prepare for your journey home. (If you prefer to return via Guayaquil, please inquire.)

Sunday, Day 10 – Quito/Home

This morning fly home — or anywhere else you might have decided to go.

ITINERARY | GALAPAGOS + PERU'S LAND OF THE INCA

16 DAYS/15 NIGHTS

Thematically, one might ask why connect a visit to Peru with an expedition to Galápagos? We have two answers: as magnificent as Galápagos is for nature, so is Peru from an historical and archaeological perspective; and second, Lima — Peru's capital is less than two hours away by air from Guayaquil, roughly the distance from New York City to Chicago. So, if you have the time, you're almost there anyway.

A couple of key issues to point out. We spend a week in Peru. Occasionally people ask, "why so long when the highlight is Machu Picchu?" The fact is that there is so much more in Peru, which you'll see when you read the itinerary. Another reason is that rushing from sea level to 11,000 feet and back is just not wise. You need time to adjust. So please, read on and we hope you become inspired to join us.

Friday, Day 1 through Friday, Day 8

As per the Galápagos itinerary on page 11.

Saturday, Day 9: Galápagos/Guayaquil/Lima, Peru

Depart Galápagos this morning and fly to Lima, Peru via Guayaquil, arriving in the early evening. Spend the night at the gracious Orient Express Miraflores Park Hotel. Tomorrow you'll be getting up early, so you are on your own for dinner. (B,L)

Sunday, Day 10: Lima/Cusco/Sacred Valley of the Inca

This morning fly from Lima to Cusco and drive to the Urubamba River Valley — the Sacred Valley of the Inca. Visit the church in Chinchero containing the oldest examples of paintings of the

Cusco School of Art and the local food market. Arrive at our hotel for lunch. The afternoon is free to explore the Valley on your own. (B,L,D)

Monday, Day 11: Sacred Valley of the Inca

Visit the town and important archaeological site of Pisac. Gateway to the Sacred Valley, Pisac has an "old town" (one of the most beautiful Inca complexes) and a "new town" from the Colonial era. Have a late lunch at the Hacienda Orihuela. Here the Orihuela family continues a 350-year tradition of farming. And, they have gathered a valuable collection of Colonial art housed in their country mansion. Members of the family will host our lunch, featuring home-cooked fare. (B,L,D)

Tuesday, Day 12: Machu Picchu

This morning visit the massive Inca stone fortress of Ollantaytambo. Then board the train for the 1½-hour ride to Machu Picchu. The citadel, "The Lost City of the Inca," straddles a mountain ridge surrounded by lush tropical forest. We'll first have a guided walk but the real magic is that between 4:30 p.m. and 10:00 a.m. (last train departs/first train arrives) most visitors are gone. By staying over, you have time when Machu Picchu is yours with only a handful of other visitors. Overnight at the Orient Express Sanctuary Lodge. (B,L,D)

Wednesday, Day 13: Machu Picchu/Cusco

Watch the day break over the quiet ruins, an almost mystical experience for many. The morning is free to continue exploring Machu Picchu.



After lunch on your own, reboard the train for our journey to Cusco. We spend two nights at the Orient Express Monasterio Hotel. A unique establishment in the city's heart, the hotel was originally built in 1592 as a monastery. (B,D)

Thursday, Day 14: Cusco

The Inca Empire's capital, Cusco, is the oldest continuously inhabited city in the Western Hemisphere. The heart of the city, as in Inca days, is the Plaza de Armas. Visit the magnificent early 17th-century cathedral built on Inca foundations, the Santo Domingo Convent — Koricancha — and the vast Sacsayhuaman Fortress, a premier example of Inca stonework. The afternoon is yours to explore. Try one of several dinner options on your own. (B,L)

Friday, Day 15: Cusco/Lima

This morning return to Lima and explore Colonial Lima, founded in 1535 by the conquistador Francisco Pizarro. Visit the 17th-century San Francisco Monastery and its unique cloisters, stroll to the Plaza Mayor to see the Government Palace and the Cathedral. Lunch, a somewhat late one as is traditional in Latin America, will be a combination of food and museum, in a sense, at Casa Aliaga. Don Jeronimo de Aliaga, a nobleman from Castille, Admiral of the Seas, co-founder of Lima and founder of the first university in the Americas, built his house in 1535 on the grounds where the last Inca governor resided. Home to 17 generations of Aliagas, this ancestral mansion is the oldest private household in continuous use in the Western Hemisphere. It is not open to the general public. This evening is on your own. (B,L)

Saturday, Day 16: Lima/Miami

This morning fly home — or anywhere else you might have decided to go. (B)

Note: If you prefer to get an early start on your journey home, an overnight flight which departs on the evening of Friday, Day 15 is available. Please inquire for information.

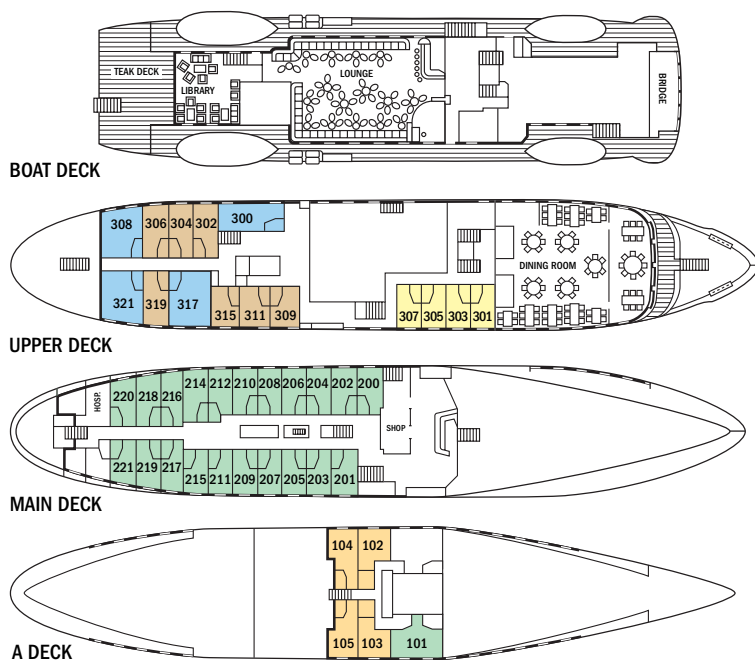
